Torah Tots with a Twist for 4 and younger with adult

We focus on fostering a love for Shabbat and holidays through stories, songs, movement, and celebration. iBaby Chicago

Kindergarten through 2nd Grades

Incorporate Hebrew through movement, Jewish customs, and values into all sessions, infused with concepts from the Torah portions. Learn the importance of Tefillah (prayer) as meaningful way of connecting to God. Delve into the dynamic ShalomLearning curriculum for a captivating learning journey, including importance of Israel to the Jewish people during community gatherings.

In 3rd to 7th Grades, students learn Jewish values through text, history, prayers, and holidays. Social Emotional Learning is integrated through videos. Key points include:

- Gimel & Dalet (3rd and 4th Grade) focus on ShalomLearning.
- Hebrew reading skills develop in Gimel (3rd Grade).
- Fluency is achieved by the end of Dalet (4th Grade).
- Hei & Vav (5th& 6th Grades) Better Together Intergenerational learning. BetterTogether
- 5th Grade starts Sunday minyan attendance.
- Holocaust study begins in Vav (6th Grade).
- Mitzvah projects prepare for B'nai Mitzvah in Vav & Zayin (6th & 7th Grades). In-depth Israel study starts in Hei (5th Grade) with the Israelink curriculum.
